I. Course Overview

1. Course Description

This course is designed to offer students an opportunity to understand the basic history of Korean ceramics in the Silla (57 BC~935 AD), Goryo (918~1392), and Joseon (1392~1910) periods. The distinctive decorative techniques of each era will be taught in this course and it will allow students to fully explore clay.

On the first day of class, the introduction to this course and to Ceramic Arts department regulations will be done. Then, a brief lecture on Korean ceramics history and contemporary artworks inspired by traditional ceramics will be given as well.

2. Prerequisites

This is an introductory-level course, so there are no prerequisites for the class.

3. Course Format

- Studio-based class
- Demonstrations are given for students to follow
- Lab fees (about 70,000 KRW) will be incurred to cover the materials and firing expenses
- Clay, glaze, kiln, and tools will be provided
- The ceramic studio is a community space that is shared by a number of classes. You are expected to clean up your work area at the completion of each class
- Refrain from the use of mobile phones during classes
- Extenuating circumstances can cover only 1 absence (documentary evidence must be submitted).
- Students will get accustomed to the preparation process; research, a rough sketch, and slab making
- This is a practical course, so face-to-face classes are ideal

This course will be a basic step for students who want to explore ceramics. Through this course, students can learn not only Korean ceramics history and production processes but also the ways in which contemporary artists find their inspiration in tradition and in daily life.
