### I. Course Overview

### 1. Course Description

The first half of the course offers a broad overview of modern Korean history, from the beginning of the twentieth century into the present, tracing the correlation between film and major cultural, historical, and political events over the same period. Focusing on how film narratives represent social reality, the course analyzes the construction and imagination of national identity across these films, which follows a loose chronology by theme rather than production date.

The second half of the course offers a broad overview of Korean "commercial auteurs"—for example, Park Chan-wook, Kim Jee-woon, and Bong Joon-ho—and their works, analyzing how they diversified New Korean Cinema in terms of subject matter, scale, and genre.

Students should come away with a sense both of the development of modern Korean film and its relationship with aspects of Korean culture and society. In addition, the course will include a strong writing component; discussion and written assignments will focus both on the films themselves as well as on related critical texts.
