I. Course Overview

1. Course Description

This course is designed to offer students an opportunity to understand the basic history of Korean ceramics in the Silla (57 BC~935 AD), Goryeo (918~1392), and Joseon (1392~1910) periods. The distinctive decorative techniques of each era will be taught in this course, and it will allow students to fully explore clay.

2. Prerequisites

This is an introductory-level course. No prerequisites for the class.

3. Course Format

- Studio-based class
- Demonstrations are given for students to follow
- Students will get accustomed to the preparation process; research, a rough sketch, and slab making.

4. Course Objectives

The purpose of this class is to introduce the student to the rich Korean Ceramic tradition and possibilities of clay as an artistic medium through practical studio work. Students will be provided the information of Korean ceramics which is renowned for its long history and rich artistic heritage. Students will learn the basic skills in ceramic making and will be encouraged to acquire the traditional Korean



decorative techniques such as incising and inlaying techniques of the Goryeo Celadon and slip brushing technique of Joseon Buncheong, etc.

Day 1	(7/1) Mon.	 Introduction & Orientation (*Orientation attendance required) Studio work begins. Learning Pinching technique. Making Pinch-bowls. Applying surface decorations to the bowl with tools. *Assignment: Carry out research on Silla pottery and bring a rough sketch of what you want to create for Day 2.
Day 2	(7/2) Tue.	Project 1 – Silla pottery: Figurine vessel Learning Coiling technique. Making vessel and applying surface decoration.
Day 3	(7/3) Wed.	Continue making vessels and applying surface decoration on the vessel. *Assignment: Carry out research on Goryeo Celadon and bring a rough sketch of what you want to create for Day 4.
Day 4	(7/4) Thu.	Project 2 - Goryeo celadon: Plates with Korean traditional patterns Learning Incising and Inlaying decoration of Goryeo Celadon. Making plates and applying surface decoration.
Day 5	(7/8) Mon.	Continue making plates and applying surface decoration with Korean traditional patterns. *Assignment: Carry out research on Joseon Buncheong and bring a rough sketch of what you want to create for Day 6.
Day 6	(7/9) Tue.	 Project 3 – Joseon Buncheong: Flat Bottle or Barrel-shaped Vessel Learning Buncheong Sagi Decoration Techniques. (Stamping, Incising, Sgraffito, Painting with Underglaze Iron etc.) Making a bottle or a vessel and applying surface decoration.
Day 7	(7/10) Wed.	Continue making Flat Bottle or Barrel-shaped Vessel and applying surface decoration.
Day 8	(7/11) Thu.	 Finish making Flat Bottle or Barrel-shaped Vessel and applying surface decoration. *Make 2 pieces of slabs (about 30x30cm) for Day 9. *Assignment: Carry out research on Joseon White Porcelain and bring a rough sketch of what you want to create for Day 9.
Day 9	(7/15) Mon.	Project 4 - Joseon White Porcelain: Water Dropper or Traditional Korean House Learning Slab-building technique. Making a box and applying surface decoration.
Day 10	(7/16) Tue.	Continue making water dropper or traditional Korean house form
Day 11	(7/17) Wed.	Continue making water dropper or traditional Korean house form and applying
